
THANK YOU TO PATRICIA WEICHMANN, board member since 2014.

'he Charles County Department of Planning and Growth Management recently published the third annual preservation magazine, Preservation Matters: Celebrating Charles County's Historic Places. Available online and in print, this publication is the centerpiece of the Charles County historic preservation survey and outreach program. Each year, many great projects are undertaken in Charles County by a whole host of partners, including private citizens, local non-profits, friends' groups, government entities, and developers. Too often in the past, valuable research and preservation accomplishments went largely unrecognized by a wider audience.



Over the last decade, while social media has provided new opportunities to stay connected with constituents, the magazine format provides a longer look and a deeper perspective on the rich stories that Charles County has to offer.

Preservation Matters draws from a wide range of preservation action. Each year, award-winning efforts taking place in Charles County are spotlighted as well as the work that is undertaken through the summer intern program. The publication also

provides an opportunity to share the findings of archaeological and historic structures studies, making the compelling stories embedded in these reports accessible to a broader audience.

Over the last three years a variety of resources have been highlighted including the ongoing documentation efforts at historic Rich Hill, a county-owned historic site; survey findings for the Pomonkey Historic District, an important early 20 th century, African American community; burial grounds and private cemeteries; and Anglican churches of the 18th and 19th century. Ostwick is an eighteenth-century historic site in Bladensburg, Maryland, composed of several structures, including a main house, two larger barns, and several smaller buildings, on a seven-plus acre landscaped parcel. The property is a Prince George's County Historic Site, listed on the National Register of Historic Places, and protected by preservation easements held by both the Maryland Historical Trust and the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission.

Built in 1746 for Christopher Lowndes, the main house is a 2 ½ story Flemish bond brick structure that sits at the top of three rising terraces at an elevation of over 50 feet, where it once would have provided views of the bustling port of Bladensburg. Lowndes's daughter, Rebecca, who married Benjamin Stoddert in 1781, was willed Bostwick upon her father's death in 1782. Stoddert, a captain in the Revolutionary War, was appointed the first Secretary of the Navy by President John Adams in 1798. He also served as the Secretary of War beginning in 1800, and in both roles until 1801. Today, Bostwick is owned by the Town of Bladensburg that stewards it in partnership with the University of Maryland Historic Preservation Program, which has classes there,


and uses the property as a preservation laboratory for students. Additionally, in the last few years, the Anacostia Watershed Society has also been involved in utilizing more of the land on the property as a plant nursery.

One of the most interesting features of Bostwick's architecture is the large brick buttress on its south end. It rises from the ground at the base of the foundation up to the second floor. Built of thick brick walls, and filled with a combination of loose, dry bricks and mortared bricks, it is massive, and was initially constructed in 1793 for much the same purpose that it serves to this day: to shore up the south

exterior masonry wall of the house. Unfortunately, in the last several years, the buttress has sustained multiple instances of damage. In 2012 a strong storm tore the roof from the buttress and destroyed it when it struck a tree on the property. The opening was covered by a tarp for several years while other, even more critical repairs were made (for example, repairing two damaged chimneys from the 2011 earthquake), but when the tarp was recently destroyed and the interior of the buttress was fully exposed to weather, it began to deteriorate. Just a few months ago, in August 2017, after several heavy downpours, the east wall of the buttress collapsed, making the repair even more urgent.


With help from the University of Maryland Historic Preservation Program, a two-phase plan was developed to reconstruct the buttress. First, the south wall will be braced with a temporary system of nine, W6 x 20 (roughly 6.2" x 6.02") wide-flange steel beams and two pieces of square 3" x 3" Hollow Structural Sections (structural pipes, essentially), all held against the building with four cast concrete block anchors. Once this system is in place, the buttress can be carefully deconstructed and documented to have a deeper knowledge of its construction. Once the first phase is complete, the second phase will involve faithfully reconstructing the buttress based on what is uncovered in the deconstruction, using as many bricks from the deconstructed buttress as possible. These projects are made

possible by grant awards from the Prince George's County Historic Property Grant Program and the Maryland Milestones Maryland Heritage Areas Authority. ■

pril is Maryland Archeology Month. The theme for this year is "Charting the Past: 30 Years of Exploring Maryland's Submerged History." Maryland, with 3,190 miles of shoreline, is one of only ten states that have a Maritime Archaeology Program (MMAP) which was established thirty years ago. The program through the efforts of able professional staff, partner organizations, and volunteers have recorded 830 submerged sites so far. 


